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WORDS FROM EL PRESIDENTÉ

I all! It's that time again. Time just keeps slipping by. I'm usually on top of getting this column done even though Phil reminds me every month, but not this month. The past month flew by and I have been busy as ever to the point that I'm glad that Phil reminded me. I lost track of the days and didn't realize my deadline was approaching. I'm glad we have Phil to keep your president on his toes, but isn't that what secretaries are for. It was Alan, our immediate past secretary that got me to start writing these columns in the first place!

This month I want to talk a bit about shows. We are all lucky live in this area when it comes to stamp shows. There is a stamp show of some type every month. I can't think of any area except for Orange County in Southern California that also has a show every month. We have the big big show, Expo, in March; a big show, Stamp Fest, in August; and the monthly small shows, SOCOPEX, in South County. That's a lot of shows! You're probably thinking about now what's my point of all of this? My point is attendance.

One of our club members, on his own, did an analysis of the number of club members who attended SOCOPEX in 2019. The number is surprising. There are 59 club members. The total number of different club members who attended throughout the entire year was only 16, or 27%! This does not count the seven club members who are dealers at the show. When I look back at the number of club members who attended Stamp Fest, that number was not much better. If my memory serves me correctly, it was about 24 or 41%. That, ladies and gentlemen, is just not good. One would think that over a period of a year, twelve shows, that

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almost all of the club members would attend SOCOPEX at least once.

The question then becomes why is that? We are members of a stamp club. We all collect stamps in some way or some type of philatelic material. That means that we have to acquire material for our collections. How are you getting your stamps and such or are you? Has the majority of the club gone to buying online? If the excuse is the dealers never have anything I'm looking for, how do you know if you don't go? The dealers who work SOCOPEX bring new material with them all the time. Go see and find out. If you can't find anything you are looking for, talk with the dealer who handles your type of material and tell them what you are looking for, and ask them to try and find it. Guess what? They will! It may take some time, but they will.

The show is also a great place to meet and greet other collectors. It's a chance to socialize with people who have a common interest. One can't do that from home! Show attendance is also critical to keeping a show running. I remind everyone that dealers don't do shows for free. While they are hobbyists, they are also business people. Dealers have to make money to keep doing shows. Therefore, I'm asking every club member to attend at least one of the twelve SOCOPEX shows during the year, just one! And while not directly sponsored by the GMCSC, SOCOPEX is really a club show. I'm also now asking every club member to attend your show, our show, the club's show, Stamp Fest, this August.

This month is voting month for last year's stamps issued by our postal service. Therefore, if you have the December issue of *Linn's*, please bring it as it has all the stamps, envelopes, and wrappers issued in 2019. It's fun to talk about what we liked and didn't like from the past year. After we vote we will send our ballots to Linn's for counting and the club will get recognition when Linn's publishes the results in May. This month Gary will also enlighten us about St. Louis stamp dealers. I have a suspicion that he's not going to talk about current St. Louis stamp dealers either. This should be very interesting. Come vote and come listen. That is all.

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PHILATELIC PHEATURES

From time to time I would like to add feature stories on stamps our members collect and on other philatelic items of interest. Thanks to John Deutch we can begin with an article from him this month.

My Philatelic Interests

My stamp collecting interests? Wow, where do I begin? Like so many others of my vintage, I started collecting stamps back in 1950 or 1951 when I was in 4th or 5th grade in north St. Louis. There was no one in my family who collected stamps, but I had several friends in my class at school who did. In those days we all sent our nickels and dimes off in the mail to various stamp companies for those "wonderful offers" (with approvals, of course) that were advertised in the back of comic books and BOYS LIFE. I continued to collect sporadically until marriage and kids, and then I sold my stamps.

Ten or fifteen years ago I got interested in stamps again. I built a pretty good collection of Scouts on stamps, which I sold, Belgium, which I sold, and Denmark, which I also sold. Today my collecting interests are centered around the stamps and postal history of the Pontifical or Roman States, and the stamps and postal history of Vatican City up to the death of Pope John XXIII in 1963. I also have a small U.S. collection of stamps, souvenir sheets, covers and other ephemera from the International Philatelic Exhibitions that were held in this country in 1913, 1926, 1933 and 1947, and the same sort of material from the 1933 APS convention, the 1934 Trans-Mississippi Philatelic Exposition, and the 1937 meeting of the Society of Philatelic Americans. It is enough to keep me occupied, and mostly out of trouble.

Stories of the Dead

We will also share stories of the "dead", dead countries that is. There are many of these and they all have a story.

One of the good things about collecting dead countries is that you get to decide what counts as a dead country. If you feel that a country that issued stamps for several years, then stopped for many years, then started again counts as a dead country for the earlier period, then it counts. If not, then it doesn't. If "offices" established by one country within another country counts, such as French offices in China, then it does.

Another good thing is that you get to decide what is "complete". If you feel every stamp issued within the country counts, then they do. If you feel a stamp overprinted or surcharged by a local post office shouldn't count, then it doesn't. However, you know they won't be issuing more stamps next month, so you really can reach completion.

Where do I start collecting dead countries? First think of smaller states that were combined into a larger, new state such as the old German or Italian states. Another possible group are the native tribal homelands within the Union of South Africa (Bophuthatswana, Ciskei, Transkei and Venda). Each of these four states issued their own stamps from about 1980 until 1994.

If you don't want to start with a dead country that issued hundreds of stamps, some of the pricey, then you don't have to. There are places for which only a very few stamps were issued. Imagine how good it feels to buy only three or four stamps and you have a complete country collection.

We will begin telling the stories of dead countries and their stamps in future issues. Stay tuned.

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
PHILATELIC PHEATURES

Pope Pius XII Memorial Library, St. Louis University

I have this cover in my Vatican collection. It was produced by the Greater St. Louis Chapter of the Vatican Philatelic Society in 1959 to mark the dedication of the Pius XII Memorial Library on the campus of St. Louis University. I find it interesting because of its connection to the Vatican, to St. Louis, and to St. Louis University---I am a St. Louie U graduate.

It was early in 1950 when Father Paul C. Reinert, SJ, the President of St. Louis University, and two of his faculty members, Fathers Daly and Donnelly, approached the Vatican about the possibility of microfilming the documents in the Vatican Library in order to make these manuscript treasures available to scholars on this side of the Atlantic Ocean.

In December 1950, permission to do so was granted by the Vatican. With funding from the Knights of Columbus, fifteen technicians with eight cameras and two developers set about the task of microfilming 11 million handwritten documents. Ultimately the Pius XII Library at St. Louis University was the recipient of 840,000 feet of microfilm on 9884 reels. The construction and naming of this library had been authorized by Pope Pius XII some years befor his death in 1958.



The cacheted covers prepared by the Greater St. Louis Chapter of the Vatican Philatelic Society were cancelled on November 22, 1959, the date the library was dedicated. The stamp on those covers is the U.S. commemorative (Scott 1107) issued in 1958 to mark the International Geophysical Year of 1957-58. The center design of this stamp---the "two hands" ---is from Michelangelo's painting of "The Creation of Man" in the Sistine Chapel.

Stories of the Dead

Dalmatia

The area known as Dalmatia has undergone many changes over the centuries. It has generally been located on the western coast of the Balkan Peninsula, across the Adriatic Sea from Italy. Its recorded history began in 180 BC when it declared itself independent from the king of Illyria. A few years later it was attacked for the first time by the Roman army. By 9 AD it had become a part of the Roman Empire.

Over the years the general area experienced many changes, from many Slavic tribes moving in, to the Byzantine Empire beginning to fail, to Venice and Hungary taking more control, to the wars with the Ottoman Empire, to the Hapsburgs of Austria-Hungary taking control.

During World War I the Italians eventually joined with the Allies, although how much they contributed to the war effort is in doubt. When the war ended, the Hapsburgs lost much of their territory since they were on the losing side. Italy demanded control of the entire Adriatic coastal area. However, the U.S. and others were against it. The entire area then nominally became part of the new country of Yugoslavia. However, the Italians were not ready to give up their claims, so their military occupied an area along the coast that had been part of Dalmatia, running roughly from Zadar in the north, through Split in the central, and down to Dubrovnik in the south. They then surcharged Italian stamps with the local currency and used them in the area from 1919 to 1922. Italy then annexed that area as part of Italy and issued Italian stamps, although it was supposed to be part of the new Yugoslavia. Following World War Ii Tito took over Yugoslavia, Dalmatia became the coastline of Croatia, and the era of the Italians in the Balkan Peninsula was over.

Below are examples of the stamps surcharged for Dalmatia. The total number issued is only 14, made up of 8 regular issue, 2 special delivery and 4 postage dues.

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PHILATELIC PHEATURES

Spanish Municipal Issues: Postage Stamps or Cinderellas?

By Ed Bayham

According to Linn's World Stamp Almanac a cinderella is a stamplike label that is not a postage stamp. Cinderellas include seals and bogus issues, as well as revenue stamps, local post issues and other similar items, per. However, a great many cinderella stamps are listed in Scott catalogues. Local postage stamps are stamps that were valid within a limited postal system.

Six stamps picturing King Alfonso XIII and Queen Victoria Eugenia were put on sale October 1, 1907 at the Madrid Industrial Exposition for financial support. They were not valid for postage.



Stamps were issued to publicize the Barcelona Philatelic Congress and EXPOSITION in 1929. Two postal tax stamps are listed in Scott as numbers 371-372. These were the only two listed of the several issues. The others are considered as promotional poster stamps.











The 1929 Barcelona International Exposition provided the pretext to urbanize a mountainous area and connect it to Barcelona. Nine million copies of these "Ayuntamiento de Barcelona" stamps were made of the first issue. Since then, new stamps were issued at Christmas, with some of the proceeds going to charity, a tradition that continued to 1950. Below are examples of local usage.

What's not affected is our ability to continue to have club meetings. I've already communicated with the Kirkwood Community center and we are still okay with what we have been doing so far, spaced out and everyone wearing masks. The CC is going to have us in the gym again, which works out great given that we have the big auction this month. That will give us plenty of space to spread out auction lots, spread us all out, and still do the auction.

The most important thing about being able to meet this month is not the auction. It's the election of two club officers (VP and secretary) for the next 2 years. Right now we have Phil standing for reelection as secretary. We'll need nominations for VP and secretary of anyone wishing to run for office. Come prepared to throw a hat in the ring as we need to make sure that these positions are filled especially the VP position since right now I don't know of any nominations. I think we have some that are considering it, but nothing definite. It's very important that we fill the VP position. It makes running the club very difficult when a position goes unfilled, which happened a couple years ago when the VP position went unfilled for a year. The club doesn't want to go through that again.

These new restrictions also do not impact the Christmas party at Syberg's on December 3rd, as of now anyway. They do affect the breakfast club

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meeting on December 14th. One of the new county restrictions is no indoor dining at anyplace that serves food and drink. However, according to the banquet manager at Syberg's, any banquets that were already scheduled are allowed to take place. That means that as of the time I'm writing this, we are still on for the Christmas party. If that should change, Syberg's said that they would call me immediately. So, those that plan on attending, please bring your payment to the meeting for the number who will be attending. If you plan on going, but can't make the meeting, you can pay at the door, but please let me or our secretary know by the 25th as I will need to give Syberg's a headcount.

How will the Christmas party work you might be asking? We will be spaced out with no more than six at a table. Masks have to be worn when entering the building, but one can remove them once in our room if they so desire. Depending on the numbers who attend, we will just order off the menu rather than have a buffet. If the headcount is above 24, then we'll go with the buffet. If we have the buffet, then there will be a shield between us and the food/servers. We'll go down the line and tell the servers what we want and they will place the food on the plate. We'll then pick up our plate at the end of the line. We'll have a hostess if anyone wants anything from the bar, which is pay as you go. If anyone leaves the room for any reason, you must wear a mask. Syberg's has assured me that they are following all of the proper protocols, and it sounds like they are. I think we will be fine and there will be fun and frolic for all.

The breakfast club meeting is canceled for this month. Not only do the new restrictions cause this, I have found out that our restaurant location for this event is closed, permanently. That obviously means that we have to find yet another location. If anyone has any ideas, please let me know.

SOCOPEX is still on for December. Another restriction that goes into effect is the limit on a businesses' capacity from 50% to 25%. That will not affect SOCOPEX as the show room capacity is large enough that there won't be a problem with exceeding capacity. If for some reason that happened, the show chairman will control access to the show.

What else? Since this will be the last meeting for this year, we look forward to starting back up in 2021. Right now we have several programs already scheduled, but still need to fill a few months. Who would like to give a presentation next year? Please let Ed know, or after the Christmas party whoever our new VP will be.
