

Philatelic Terms for Beginners

Archival =

According to the dictionary, this word refers to something stored as records (archives).

But for collectors, this term, used by a company, means that their product will not rot away, even over a long period of time, or hurt something a collector has put with it. This word is especially common with plastic sleeves or paper pages used to protect photos, artwork, or stamps.

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ZEPPELIN TALES: the end

The round-the world flight of the Graf Zeppelin in 1929 was a huge success in several ways: monetarily, thanks to philatelic mail (\$3.50 per letter), record-wise, it set a number of flight "firsts" (including first flight across the Pacific), and in publicity. It brought great popularity to the both Zeppelins and to Hugo Eckener, the captain and and company head. It was because of this incredible popularity that the US POD created its Zeppelin airmails (C-13,14, and 15) for the inaugural South American flight of May, 1930.

The Zepp stamps went on sale only from April through June of 1930, and only at the 100 biggest cities in the country. And the stamps were expensive, especially considering the depression. Only 220,000 stamps were sold of 3 million printed. 55,000 cards and letters were mailed, mostly on the New Jersey to Germany leg.

In April 1933 the dirigible USS Akron crashed off the east coast, and in February 1935, the USS Macon crashed off the west coast, and US military interest in airships ended. The USS Los Angeles was stored away. Spectacular crashes by a British airship and a French airship in the 20's had ended those countries' interest in rigid airships. The secretive Russians had built airships using an Italian expert, but they were unseen-except on stamps. So the Germans were all alone in having a long-term success with rigid airships.

The Nazi government bought a controlling interest in the Zeppelin company's airline and it continued and prospered. The Graf Zeppelin again inspired a special stamp (C-18, the "baby zepp"), for its visit to the Chicago world's fair in 1933. Captain Eckener carefully kept the side of the ship with swastikas facing away from the fair site as he circled Chicago.

Zeppelin number LZ129, the Hindenburg, was finished in 1936. It was bigger (50+ passengers) and better than the Graf Zeppelin. With two ships, the airline could begin regularly scheduled flights between the US and Europe, on top of the South American service. The first season went well, (Atlantic weather was too dangerous in the winter), and 1 more airship was under construction.

In May 1937, the *Hindenburg* was landing at New Jersey when it burst into flames. 36 people out of the total 97 crew and passengers were killed. News-movies were there, so it became the best photographed disaster in history. That was the end of the Zeppelin airline.

The German government was not willing for the Zeppelin story to end badly, however; they had used the airships constantly for propaganda and goodwill publicity. So the LZ 130, named the Graf Zeppelin II, was finished, and another airship begun. Dr. Eckener was unwilling to carry any regular civilian passengers, however, unless they could get Helium (which is non-flammable) to use instead of flammable Hydrogen. Only the US had Helium, and when Germany annexed Austria in 1938, FDR backed out of a previous promise to sell some.

The Graf Zeppelin II made a number of short flights in Europe, mainly for propaganda, and some attempts at spying on British radar were made. But when Germany invaded Poland in 1939, and WWII began for real, Zeppelins were grounded for good. They were too slow and susceptible to be a weapon, and some of the Nazi leaders had never liked the Zeppelin Co. (which was anti-Nazi). The hangars and airships were dismantled for scrap.

In the US, the Los Angeles was dismantled too, but blimps, the smaller airships without a rigid frame, served to good purpose during WWII as sub spotters.

Philatelic Terms for Beginners

Stamp tongs:

Like tweezers, but NOT the same thing.

Philatelic tongs are must-haves for every real collector, to preserve valuable stamps by keeping skin oil and dirt off.

There are several types of ends and sizes: Some have very pointy ends, some have rounded, "spade" type ends, some have squared ends; some have a bend in direction near the tips, etc.. I have not found that any particular type is better than another, except that the thinner the ends, the easier one can grab a stamp lying flat on the table.

What's the difference between tweezers and tongs? The stamp gripping area is smooth and polished, with edges rounded off, to avoid accidentally scratching or tearing the stamp face.

THE PERF-DISPATCH

Acid

In chemistry, a substance capable of forming hydrogen ions when dissolved in water. Acids can weaken cellulose in paper, board, and cloth, leading to embrittlement. Acids may be introduced in the manufacture of library materials and may be left in intentionally (as in certain sizings), or incidentally. Acids may also be introduced by migration from other materials or from atmospheric pollution. See also pH and Acid migration.

Acid-free

In chemistry, materials that have a pH of 7.0 or higher. Sometimes used incorrectly as a synonym for alkaline or buffered. Such materials may be produced from virtually any cellulose fiber source (cotton and wood, among others), if measures are taken during manufacture to eliminate active acid from the pulp. However free of acid a paper or board may be immediately after manufacture, over time the presence of residual chlorine from bleaching, aluminum sulfate from sizing, or pollutants in the atmosphere may lead to the formation of acid unless the paper or board has been buffered with an alkaline substance.

Acid Migration

The transfer of acid from an acidic material to a less acidic or pH neutral material. This may occur directly, when the two materials are in intimate contact. For instance, acid may migrate from boards, endpapers, and protective tissues, as well as the paper covers of books and pamphets, to the less acidic paper of the text.

Acrylic

A plastic noted for transparency, light weight, weather resistance, color fastness and rigidity. In addition to these qualities, acrylics are important in preservation because of their stability, or resistance to chemical change over time, a characteristic not common to all plastics. Acrylics and available in sheets, films, and resin adhesives, some common trade names for the sheet form are: Perspex*, Lucire* and PlexiGlas*

Alkaline

Alkaline substances have a pH over 7.0. They may be added to a material to neutralize acids or as an alkaline reserve or buffer for the purpose of counteracting acids that may form in the future. A buffer may be added during manufacture or during the process of deacidification. While a number of chemicals may be used as buffers, the most common are magnesium carbon-

Alpha cellulose

A form of cellulose derived from cotton. The presence of alpha cellulose in paper or board is one indication of its stability or longevity. Non-cellulosic components of wood are believed to contribute to the degradation of paper and board.

Buffer

See Alkaline.

Calcium Carbonate

An alkaline chemical used as a buffer in papers and boards.

Cellulose

The chief constituent of the cell walls of all plants. Also, the chief constituent of many fibrous plant products, including paper and some cloth.

Chemical Stability

Not easily decomposed or otherwise modified chemically. This is a desirable characteristic for materials used in preservation, since it suggests an ability to resist chemical degradation (such as the embrittlement of paper), over time and/or upon exposure to various conditions during use or storage. Other terms used loosely as synonyms; inert, stable, chemically inert.

Conservation

The treatment of library or archive materials, works of art, or museum objects to stabilize them chemically or strengthen them physically, sustaining their survival as long as possible in their original form. See also Preservation.

Deacidification

A common term for a chemical treatment that neutralizes acid in a material such as paper and deposits an alkaline buffer to counteract future acid attack. Deacidification technically refers only to the neutralization of acids present at the time of treatment, not to the deposit of a buffer. For this reason, the term is being slowly replaced with the more accurate phrase "neutralization and alkalization". While deacidification, increases the chemical stability of paper, it does not restore strength or flexibility to brittle materials. See also pH.

Encapsulation

A form of protective enclosure for papers and other flat objects; involves placing the item between two sheets of transparent polyester film that are subsequently sealed around all edges. The object is thus physically supported and protected from the atmosphere, although it may continue to deteriorate in the capsule. Because the object is not adhered to the polyester, it can be removed simply by cutting one or more edges of the polyester.

Fiber content

A statement of the types and percentages of fibers used in the manufacture of a paper, board, or cloth. Important because the quality of the fiber significantly affects both the durability and chemical stability of the material.

Fiberboard

Paperboard made of laminated sheets of heavily pressed fiber.

Inert

See Chemical Stability.

Lamination

A process of reinforcing fragile paper, usually with thin, translucent or transparent sheets. Some forms of lamination are considered unacceptable as conservation methods because of potential damage from high heat and pressure during application, instability of the lamination materials, or difficulty in removing the laminated item, especially long after the treatment was performed.

Lianin

A component of the cell walls of plants that occurs naturally, along with cellulose. Lignin is largely responsible for the strength and rigidity of plants, but its presence in paper and board is believed to contribute to chemical degradation. It can be, to a large extent; removed during manufacture. No standards exist for the term "lignin-free" and additional research is needed to determine the precise role of lignin in the durability and permanence of paper.

Mil

Unit of thickness equalling one thousandth of an inch (.001").

Mylare

See Polyester.

Neutral

Having a pH of 7; neither acid nor alkaline.

pH

In chemistry, pH is a measure of the concentration of hydrogen ions in a solution, which is a measure of acidity or alkalinity. The pH scale runs from 0 to 14, and each number indicates a tenfold increase. Seven is pH neutral; numbers below 7 indicate increasing acidity, with 1 being most acid. Numbers above 7 indicate increasing alkalinity, with 14 being most alkaline. Paper with a pH below 5 is considered highly acidic. Buffered storage materials typically have a pH between 7 and 9. See also Acid; Alkaline.

Permanence

Ability of a material to resist chemical deterioration, but not a quantifiable term. Permanent paper usually refers to a durable alkaline paper that is manufactured according to ANSI Standard Z39.48-1984 Permanence of Paper for Printed Library Materials. Even so called permanent materials depend for their longevity upon proper storage conditions. See also Chemical Stability.

PlexiGlas®

Trade name for acrylic sheet material made by Rohm and Haas. See Acrylic for other trade names.

Point

A unit of thickness of paper or board; one thousandth of an inch. For example, :060" equals sixty points. See also Mil.

Polyester

A common name for the plastic polyethylene terephthalate. Its characteristics include transparency, colorlessness, and high tensile strength. In addition, it is useful in preservation because it is very chemically stable. Commonly used in sheet or film form to make folders, encapsulations and book jackets. Its thickness is often measured in mils. Common trade names are Mylar® by DuPont and Melinex® by ICI.

Polyethylene

A chemically stable, highly flexible, transparent or translucent plastic. Used in preservation to make sleeves for photographic materials, among other uses.

Polypropylene

A stiff, heat resistant, chemically stable plastic. Common uses in preservation: sleeves for 35mm slides or films, containers.

Polyvinyl Acetate (PVA)

A plastic usually abbreviated as PVA. A colorless transparent solid, it is usually used in adhesives, which are themselves also referred to as PVA or PVA adhesive. There are dozens of PVA adhesives, some are "internally plasticized" and are suitable for use in conservation, due to greater chemical stability among other qualities.

Polyvinyl Chloride (PVC)

A plastic, often abbreviated as PVC. It is not as chemically stable as some other plastics, since it can emit hydrochloric acid (which in turn can damage library materials) as it deteriorates, and therefore has limited application in the preservation of books and paper. Some plastics called vinyl may be polyvinyl chloride.

Preservation

Activities associated with maintaining library, archival, or museum materials for use, either in their original physical form or in some other format. Preservation is considered a broader term than Conservation. See Conservation.

Pressboard

A tough, dense, highly glazed paperboard, used where strength and stiffness are required of a relatively thin (e.g. .030") board. It is almost as hard as a sheet of fiberboard, and is commonly used for the covers of notebooks. See also Solid board, Fiberboard.

Reversibility

Ability to undo a process or treatment with no change to the object. Reversibility is an important goal of conservation treatment, but it must be balanced with other treatment goals and options.

Sizings

Chemicals added to paper that make it less absorbent, so that inks applied will not bleed. Acidic sizings can be harmful and can cause paper to deteriorate, but some are not acidic and are expected to be more chemically stable.

Solid Board

A paperboard made of the same material throughout. Distinct from a combination board where two or more types of fiber stock are used, in layers. See also Fiberboard. Pressboard.

Stability

See Chemical stability.

UV Filter

A material used to filter the ultraviolet (UV) rays out of visible light. Ultraviolet radiation is potentially damaging to library, archival, and museum objects and more is present in sunlight and fluorescent light than in incandescent light. Removing UV radiation from storage, use, and exhibition spaces can reduce the rate of deterioration of library materials stored there. Usually-a UV filtering material is placed over windows or fluorescent light tubes, or over glass used in framing, or in exhibition cases. Certain acrylic sheet materials have UV filtering properties built in.

Viny

The word vinyl is imprecisely used to refer to any of a number of plastics, many of which are not appropriate for use in preservation. For specific safe plastics, see Polyester, Polypropylene, Polyvinyl acetate, Acrylic.

STAMP HINGES

The following table shows the results of stamp hinge testing by the Arthur Salm Foundation (part of the Chicago Collectors Club). Thirty hinges were used from each brand. These were mounted on a stamp album page. After drying one week, the hinges were pulled off manually. Each brand seemed to adhere about as well as the next. Some brands seemed to tear and leave a hinge remnant every time ("100% tear"), whereas some brands came off more cleanly ("peelable") and some were in-between.

The third column shows the acidity/alkalinity (of the hinge paper and glue combined). The higher the number the better for archival use: 7.0 is neutral, and archival paper is 7.0 or higher. The only good hinge on that basis is the Novofold, a Swedish product. Next best is Dennison prefolded #48-064.

This means that no hinges typically sold in the U.S. are good for long term mounting of stamps, and Expensive Material should always be mounted in best quality plastic mounts (Showguard, Scott, Hawid, etc.).

FIRST First Day Cover

More than once, in quizzes at club meetings, we have asked questions concerning the first "First Day Cover": by which I usually mean a souvenir envelope with a printed cachet on the left and a stamp just issued that day, sometimes with a special cancel.

Recently I have seen in Linn's News that I was wrong. The first first day cover was mailed December 10, 1920 by the Pitney Bowes Postage Meter Co., from Stamford Conn., to mark the first day of usage for the first officially approved commercial meter stamp.

In the upper right is a meter mark, printed in yellow. In the upper left is Pitney Bowes name and a printed box explaining that this is the first P.O. accepted meter, etc.. In terms of what my home mail looks like, this cover is more important than any George Linn produced souvenir.



Most of these fairs sought and received state and federal money, (as well as local support & investment), and fairs of this caliber generally made a profit and must have had political pull.

- 1. The Colombian Exposition, Chicago 1893; (honoring Columbus a little late) 16 stamps 2. The Trans-Mississippi and International Exposition of 1898, Omaha; (promoting and honoring the settlement of the Western US) 9 stamps
- 3.The Pan American Exposition of 1901, Buffalo (celebrating the new century and American technical achievements); 6 stamps
 4.The Louisiana Purchase Exposition, Here, 1904 (celebrating the 100th anniversary of the Louisiana Purchase a little late) 5 stamps
- 5. The Jamestown Exposition, 1907 (celebrating the 300th anniversary of the founding of the first European settlement in the US) 3 stamps.

Yes there really was an international fair in 1907, near Norfolk, Virginia: the site is now the Norfolk Naval Yard.

- **6.**The first real commemorative stamp is the Lincoln Memorial Issue, 1909 Scott 367-369

Dealer Talk

The following complaints are excerpted from a letter by dealer Kenneth C.Arno, printed in the magazine *The Stamp Wholesaler*.

"By actual count, nearly 60% of my new collector customers have committed one or more of the following errors or outright indiscretions...

- 1. Stealing stamps by mail [by not paying for stamps kept].
- 2. Not returning stamps or payment on or before due date.
- 3. Not answering your dealers' request for return or payment.
- 4. Claiming not to have received stamps you did receive.
- 5. Paying by bad checks or credit cards.
- 6. Returning material with postage due.
- 7. Not preparing return packaging to protect returns.
- 8. Deducting return postage costs by keeping stamps.
- 9. Sending loose change.
- 10. Using multiple names or addresses.
- 11. Breaking stamp sets.
- 12. Switching stamps.
- 13. Ordering less than a minimum order limit.
- 14. Mis-adding money totals.
- 15. Cherry-picking packets or mixes (and then returning).
- 16. No signature or date on correspondence.
- 17. Lying about being a minor (or adult).
- 18. Not notifying a dealer when you move.
- 19. Stealing a few stamps from packets that you think may not be noticed.
- 20. Trying to pay for purchases with unused stamps.
- 21. Requesting donations for charity, cherry picking them, and then donating the rest in your own name.

....."Inform your dealer about problems so that he or she has an opportunity to correct them. Do expect to pay a price for stamps that allows your dealer to service your order..."


