A Faraway Place

Saint Helena is a tiny mote in the south Atlantic Ocean about 1000 miles from anywhere. Its closest neighbor is Ascension Island, situated 1100 kms to the northwest.

It is most famous for being the site of the second exile of Napoleon Bonaparte.

The Population

The St. Helenians (who refer to each other as "Saints") are of mixed origin, being descended from British settlers sent out by the East India Company and from many company employees and slaves from the South Asian sub-continent, the East Indies and Madagascar as well as a small number of Chinese and Africans. There are about 6000 Saints, more than 750 working on Ascension Island and in the Falklands.

History

St.Helena was uninhabited when discovered by the Portuguese navigator Joao da Nova Castella on May 21, 1502 and was named in honor of St.Helena, mother of the Emperor Constantine the Great, whose festival falls on that day in the Eastern Church calendar. The (British) East India Company started the first permanent settlement at "Chapel Valley", now Jamestown, in 1659. After a brief Dutch occupation in 1673 the company kept the island until 1834, when it was brought under the direct government of the Crown. It's still a colony of Great Britain.

Napoleon


The best-known episode in the history of the island is Napoleon Bonaparte's exile here from 1815 until his death in 1821. The houses in which Napoleon lived, one at the Briars (close to Cable & Wireless) and one at Longwood (now neighboring the Jamestown golf course), and his original gravesite are owned and maintained by the French Government and attract much interest.

Between 1900 and 1902 some 6000 Boer prisoners -of-war were imprisoned on St.Helena and a large British garrison was stationed there.

Now that you know some history, come to our meeting in January to see the stamps of this fascinating faraway land.

We are still accepting donations of carpet, bookends, 4 drawer files, file folders and office supplies, folding table, books, or energy.


ST. LOUIS STAMP EXPO 1999

Philatelic Terms for Beginners:

Printing-on-the-back:

I don't know if there is a term for this, but there aught to be... The Celebrate the Century Stamps all have explanatory printing on the backs, but some earlier stamps had other things:

Due to paper shortages, Latvian stamps #1-2 were printed on German military maps, and some Russian stamps were printed using money paper, and were used as paper money too. Latvia 63, 68-9 were printed on the backs of various unfinished bank notes as the government changed; Many Spanish stamps of the early 1900s have control numbers on the back (to discourage theft), similarly for Mexico in 1872, Prussia, etc..

LIBRARY Open

Churchill The Resilient Politician

Although Winston Churchill's finest hour was his leadership of Great Britain during the Second World War, this was not all there was to his career.

Churchill was born in 1874, graduated from a military school and became an cavalry officer in India- then got out. He went to the Boer War as a news correspondent, was captured and escaped across S.Africa, became a national hero, and was elected to Parliament all in a year's time. By the time of WWI, he was First Lord of the Admiralty (and only 40 years old).

In 1915 Churchill was one of the originators and prime supporter of the Dardanelles Campaign. The idea was to attack Turkey, ally of Germany and Austria-Hungary, at the "Dardanelles Narrows" (or Bosporus Straits) at Istanbul, so as to split the Ottoman Empire (Turkey), connect with ally Russia by the Black Sea, and end the stalemate in Europe. It didn't work (see the movie Gallipoli),- in fact, it was such a failure that eventually a total withdrawal was made, after 250,000 Allies were killed or injured. Churchill resigned, and went to France for a short time as a volunteer battalion commander. By late 1917 he was back, needed for a coalition government cabinet.

In 1922 his political party, the Liberals, collapsed, so he joined the Conservative Party, and was back in Parliament in two years; not to be out of political involvement until his retirement at the age of 81.

Airmail in the Depression

In May 1930, in the midst of the new Depression. Republican Postmaster General Walter Folger Brown called a series of closed door meetings-(later referred to by Democrats as "Spoils Conferences") - to divvy up airmail contracts. Brown, who had spent the year since his appointment by Herbert Hoover studying country's fledgling airmail system, was eager to put into effect a new piece of legislation known as the McNary-Watres Act that had become law during the previous month.

The legislation, authored by Brown himself, contained 3 important provisions: Operators would be paid for flying mail according to the space available for mail in their planes (as much as \$1.25 per mile for a large aircraft such as a Ford Trimotor); the postmaster could extend consolidate routes at his discretion; and routes would be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder who had owned an airline operation on a daily schedule of at least 250 miles over a six-month period.

Brown's goal was to use the money involved in mail delivery to build a viable and safe commercial airline system. This had been going on since late 1925, when the existing routes were privatized, but the flexibility given to the USPOD was powerful. Once put onto place, the airmail contract system subsidized large operations at the expense of smaller carriers, giving substantial incentives to airlines to acquire large multiengine airplanes and develop passenger routes.

The airmail money increased in 1932, when the rate system was raised from its bargain basement 1928 price of 5¢/ oz. to 8¢. This was also the era of Zeppelin stamps, which had more to do with subsidizing commercial air development than with express mail.

The new system actually did result in a much stronger commercial aviation system early in the 1930s. But the postmaster soon alienated many airlines by his insistence on forcing mergers- for

example between Southwest AirFast Express and American Air Lines. His heavy handed management resulted in charges of favoritism by large and small operators alike. The election of FDR meant things were bound to change, especially when a Senator Black started a well publicized Following allegations of fraudulent practices on the part of the USPOD in allocating contracts, the system was canceled by FDR February 1934. Later in 1934, the airmail was reduced to 6¢/oz.

Of course, no alternative arrangement was handy, so the Army was simply ordered to take over the airmail system. The result was a fiasco, with several pilot deaths and crashes within a few weeks.

One aircraft company was especially affected. Young William E. Boeing had founded Pacific Air Company in 1916, using money from his lumber business. In 1927 he began expanding and buying related small firms, organizing what became United Aircraft and Transport, an all in one company (aircraft maker, airline, flight school, etc.) which was one of the big beneficiaries of the new mail business. But part of the political fallout over the controversy was a forced breakup: the government felt Boeing had too much of a monopoly. Boeing aircraft and United Airlines resulted. The incredibly wealthy Boeing was so angry he retired from business.

No other individual, before or since, has held as much power over America's airways as Postmaster General W.F.Brown.

Playing Hookey


The editor is playing hookey this week, so here is a big cover and a small article.

I am pleased to invite you to share your weekend with us at StampFest, Sept. 4 &5.






STAMPFEST 99 Thank-you's

Recently in the news you have heard about East Timor, in Indonesia. Philatelists know it as Timor, a dead country now probably coming back to life. Timor was used as a name on stamps from 1885 to 1975.

Back before WWII, the area now known as Indonesia was mostly controlled by the Dutch, and known as the Netherlands Indies, or Dutch East Indies. But one island had been fought over or held by the Portuguese and the Dutch as a colony from the 1500's on, and they had eventually divided up this island, with about two-thirds as East Timor for the Portuguese Even taken as a whole, Timor is not very big, only about 280 miles by 65 miles wide, with under 2 million people.

The stamps of the Portuguese portion were always marked just TIMOR, but there was no confusion-West Timor was part of the area of the NETHERLANDS INDIES. The E. Timor stamps of the late 1800's are a mix of special stamps printed for Timor and other Portuguese colony stamps overprinted TIMOR. None of them are incredibly expensive or rare.

In 1975 Indonesia decided to take over East Timor: there were rebels, but no outside country got involved that until now. Will there soon be new postal stamps for a reborn country?

Indonesia is a country made up of many small islands, and many people of different ethnic/racial backgrounds and many widely different religious groups. Is there a possibility that more islands would like to, and will try to, be independent? You bet-- That's certainly on the minds of those in the central government and army. Next to go will be Irian Jaya, the easternmost island.

The large island of New Guinea, directly north of Australia, was divided in the 1800's between Netherlands and Great Britain. Britain took the eastern half, now PAPUA NEW GUINEA, and the Dutch took the western half. When the people of Netherlands Indies fought for independence after WWII, the Dutch kept control of their half of New Guinea, the excuse being that they had partially administered New Guinea as a separate colony. So from 1950 to 1962, there are stamps issued for NETHERLANDS NEW GUINEA alone. Fighting continued. Then the UN took over the territory, as a transitional period— and used the Dutch stamps, overprinted UNTEA (United Nations Territorial Executive Authority)— only in 1962-1963.

The area was then turned over to Indonesia. For a few years, the government printed separate stamps for IRIAN BARAT, but that ended in 1970. Since then it has been known as Irian Jaya. Fighting continues, as the central government sends excess population in (from western islands) and takes wealth out (gold, oil, exotic lumber, etc.)



Philatelic Terms for Beginners

Mexican Xmas Seals:

There are TB Seals used for fund raising, but they almost seem like revenues. The first year of issue was not until 1943.

Mexican seals were produced in the government printing office on government postal paper until 1956. They are usually denominated, and sold for that set price through post offices. They are aggressively pushed by the P.O., and are often found in Mexico stamp mixtures, having been put on cover and cancelled along with a real stamp (sometimes by confused gringos).


